


Vision



- HIJIS Program initiated in March 2007
- Strategic Plan adopted in 2008
 - Business-driven
 - Technology-enabled
- Agency decision makers and operational practitioners define their business requirements for information sharing and access; requirements drive goals, objectives, and approach for the HIJIS Program
- Builds enterprise-wide information sharing to:
 - Improve public safety & homeland security
 - Enhance efficiency of operations
- Leverages national information sharing standards and best practices



HIJIS Governance





Memorandum of Agreement (MOA)

- In 2008 each HIJIS Executive member signed an MOA committing their own, agency, and staff to support HIJIS and its initiatives
- Re-signed in 2011 with current Executive members to reconfirm prior commitment including privacy policy
- Re-signed in 2012 with current Executive members to commit to Federated Identity Management

HIJIS Architecture

- As part of our strategic planning process we developed a Technical Architecture for HIJIS with SEARCH, utilizing:
 - Service Oriented Architecture (SOA)
 - Center of Excellence (COE)
- We will leverage national best practices and toolkits, including:
 - National Information Exchange Model (NIEM) 2.0
 - Justice Information Exchange Model (JIEM) reference model
 - Global Justice Reference Architecture (GRA)
 - Global Federated Identity and Privilege Management (GFIPM)
 - Industry standards
- Opportunity to collaborate with ICSD/OIMT to align and extend the State's technical architecture, and ensure statewide infrastructure supporting HIJIS



HIJIS Joins Open Justice Broker Consortium (OJBC)

- HIJIS has begun taking advantage of the OJBC collaboration:
 - OJB broker serves as "hub" for HIJIS federated query
 - Interface for sharing criminal history information (CJIS Hawaii)
 - Reuse of existing bench warrants information
 - Interface with existing state web portal platform (HIC)
- Allowed us to build query pilot very rapidly (six weeks)




OJB Supported Standards

OJB contains turnkey, off-the-shelf implementations of:

- **NIEM** 2.0
- JIEM reference model
- -GRA
- GFIPM
- Industry standards (web services, etc.)

Similarities to HIJIS...

- ▶ Technical architecture (SOA, COE)
- Leverage national best practices and tools (NIEM, JIEM, GRA)
- Governance
- Goals
 - ▶ Facilitate sharing of criminal history information
 - ▶ Enable reuse of infrastructure and technology investments
 - Collaborate to avoid costly silo implementations
 - Build an enterprise-wide justice information sharing framework
 - Integrate business processes across independent justice partner organizations



Maine & the OJBC


- Maine joins Open Justice Broker Consortium (OJBC)
 - Value to reusing exchanges at the state level, so why not nationally?
 - Conform to the same national standards
 - Use same open source technology
 - Have the same needs for common set of exchanges
 - Value in being able to reuse what other states have developed
 - Avoid creating exchanges from scratch (less costly)
 - Value in
 - Developing information sharing capabilities collectively
 - Making our work available to others
 - Working collaboratively with other Consortium members and staff to further development of common exchanges

Pilot Project – Maine Incident Reporting Service

- Maine State Police partners with the Maine Prosecutors' Association
 - ▶ N-DEx* Record Submission and Charge Referral
 - Uses standard NIEM N-DEx Information Exchange Package Document (IEPD)
 - Incident information from law enforcement records system is delivered either:
 - ▶ To N-DEx, or
 - ▶ To Prosecutors' case management system, or
 - ▶ To both destinations



^{*} Law Enforcement National Data Exchange



Pilot Project and OJBC - Benefits

- Maine law enforcement can use N-DEx to share incident data locally and nationally
- Prosecutors experiencing savings by eliminating duplicate data entry
- Using OJB technology (open source) kept costs down



Pilot Project and OJBC Benefits

- By applying GRA standards, developed software and design concepts that can be shared with OJBC
 - Exchange available to OJBC members
 - Reuse of infrastructure and technology investments
- Next 18 month planning cycle under review
 - Potentially includes subscription/notification service
 - Using Hawaii's OJBC contribution will result in a more affordable and attainable objective

What is the OJBC?

- What is it?
 - A new consortium of justice organizations / initiatives / jurisdictions
 - Goal of consortium: <u>reduce cost</u> and <u>increase speed</u> of implementing integrated justice through reuse
 - 100% Member-Governed and Dues-Funded
- How are we working towards this goal?
 - Collaborating on common exchanges
 - Sharing technology (standards-compliant, open source)
 - Developing shared staff expertise
 - Sharing lessons learned

Why the OJBC?

Information Sharing is more important than ever:

- Public safety and homeland security
- Cost savings from automation
- Accountability
- Support for innovative business practices

But we can't afford not to consider:

- Sharing tools and technology
- Collaborating and coordinating efforts
- Leveraging open source software
- Harvesting what we've planted


What We've Demonstrated

- Three members: Hawaii, Maine, Vermont
- Open source technology works and interoperates with proprietary software where necessary
- Global standards (GRA, GFIPM, NIEM) are viable and supported by open source
- Architecture/approach support rapid delivery of live exchanges at very low cost (around 10-20% of the cost of commercial/proprietary alternatives)
